

Born of the earliest forms of theater, the image of the clown inhabits some of the most intimate areas of human psychology. Appearing most commonly as a symbol of folly, frivolity, and comic relief, lurking beneath this type of representation are sad clowns longing for acceptance, mischievous clowns instigating mayhem, and malicious clowns that insult and provoke to the point of retaliation. The most insidious clowns are those that prey on the subconscious in the form of childhood nightmares. Clowns are an adult invention—adults in makeup playing out desires extending beyond expected social paradigms—mirroring our maturation and enabling us to come to terms with the realities of our world. 2000 CLOWNS is an exhibition of twelve artists who have used this popular and compelling character in their work, identifying the clown not only as the fool, but also as a surrogate for the human individual—alone and imperfect.

A selection of circus posters and memorabilia from Milner Library's Special Collections and the collection of Mark Newgarden will be displayed in conjunction with 2000 CLOWNS.
