Search for and describe ways the artwork relates to the title of Hopler's poem.</p> <p>If you were to make an artwork in response to a book or poem, which book or poem would you choose?</p>	<p>Go to the small, black-and-white photographs of the artist with his eyes closed. When the artist took these self-portraits, he was imagining what his life might have looked like if he had stayed in Peru rather than moving to the United States.</p> <p>What do you imagine another version of your life would look like? How is it similar to or different from your current life?</p>	<p>Find the large photographs of people with their eyes closed.</p> <p>Based on what you see, describe what you think they might have been thinking or feeling when the photos were taken.</p>
